About the Course

Through self and collaborative exploration, students will develop skills in all aspects of acting. During this course students will investigate stagecraft, voice, movement, text, improvisation, and performance within focused units of study. Students will be assessed and evaluated through rubrics, portfolios, self-reflection, group-reflection, and quizzes. The student will become more confident in not only their acting skills, their movement and vocal quality but their public speaking skills in general. The course will be broken into the following areas/units:

- The Stage: Parts, Types, & Stage Directions
- Warm-ups & Theatre Games
- Improvisation
- History of Theatre
- Shakespeare
- Careers in Theatre
- Mime & Stage Combat

- The Voice & Personal Resources
- Character Analysis
- Monologues & Scene Acting
- Musical Theatre
- Puppetry
- Technical Theatre/ Design
- Script Reading & Writing

Attendance and Participation

Your attendance and participation in EVERY class is imperative! We can't play if all our team members aren't present. Participation means arriving prepared, engaging in warm-ups and activities, using class time productively, showing respect for all classmates, and giving full effort in performances and projects. Disruptive or uncooperative behavior will impact your participation grade.

1 tardy to class will result in 1 lunch detention. 3 unexcused tardies to the same class in the same 6-week grading period will result in 1 day of ISS and loss of final exam exemption in that class.

Performance Etiquette & Respect

In this class, we are each other's audience and creative partners. Every student deserves the opportunity to perform in a safe, supportive environment. This means:

- Listening attentively and without side conversations when someone else is performing or speaking.
- Offering positive, constructive feedback when appropriate.
- Encouraging your classmates and celebrating their efforts, even if they make mistakes.

 Avoiding any behavior—such as talking, laughing at mistakes, making unnecessary noises, or moving around the room—that could distract or disrupt a performance.
- Remaining in your assigned space during performances unless given permission to move.
